Current WarmUp Cincy Programs

<u> Whole Building Retrofit Pilot</u>

Partnering with <u>Over-the-Rhine Community Housing</u>, <u>Green Umbrella</u>, and multiple research institutions, this pilot focuses on comprehensive energy efficiency upgrades in 6 multifamily buildings within OTRCH's affordable housing portfolio.

Renter and Landlord Energy Efficiency Engagement

Administered <u>by Strategies to End Homelessness</u>, this program supports both low-income renters and landlords through education, utility bill assistance, and incentives for landlords to complete electricity saving upgrades at the building and unit level.

Home Repair Service Energy Efficiency

Funds from WarmUp Cincy are bolstering the energy efficiency efforts of the Home Repair Service led by the City's Building and Inspections Department. Through the HRS Program, People Working Cooperatively offers emergency repair grants to help income eligible homeowners.
