Climate Safe Neighborhoods

Climate Safe Neighborhoods (CSN) is a national effort through Groundwork USA to identify neighborhoods that are more vulnerable to the effects of climate change because of racial and social injustices, spread awareness and educate residents in those neighborhoods, and ignite action towards climate resilience. The Climate Safe Neighborhoods Partnership explores the relationship between historically race-based housing segregation and the current and predicted impacts of climate change. Effective community engagement is important for creating better policies and programs, addressing inequality, and building resilient communities. Since 2021, Groundwork Ohio River Valley (GORV) and Green Umbrella in partnership with the City of Cincinnati's Office of Environment and Sustainability developed neighborhood Climate Advisory Groups to identify solutions to address extreme heat and flooding. Through intentional engagement with residents in priority communities, the effort honors community members as the subject matter experts in identifying local issues and co-creating community-based solutions. Residents that commit to the 8 week learning and planning effort are compensated for their time and expertise. The goal of each cohort is to develop neighborhood resilience maps as a platform for activating the residents' vision and advocating for resources. As of early 2023, 8 neighborhoods and 38 resident leaders have created Climate Resilience Plans. Many components of these plans are reflected in the 2023 Green Cincinnati Plan (GCP).

Climate Advisory Groups

Since Spring 2021, Groundwork Ohio River Valley and Green Umbrella have led 3 Climate Advisory Groups (CAG) in Lower Price Hill, Bond Hill and Roselawn, and the Beekman Corridor (English Woods, Millvale, North Fairmount, South Cumminsville, and South Fairmount) in partnership with the City of Cincinnati's Office of Environment and Sustainability. The CAGs brought together dozens of community leaders of all ages to raise awareness of climate impacts in our most vulnerable communities, create climate resilience plans, and engage community members in government climate planning and action. These efforts were led through Groundwork Ohio River Valley and Green Umbrella's Climate Safe Neighborhoods Partnership,¹ which is dedicated to centering underserved communities, equity, and justice in regional climate planning and implementation efforts in Greater Cincinnati. Evidence of recent implementation from the mapping process was a large, collaborative tree planting effort led by Groundwork Ohio River Valley in Lower Price Hill during fall 2022.² Additional CAGs are planned for 2023 and beyond as many communities see the value and potential these opportunities provide.








Bond Hill Climate Resilience Plan














Climate Safe Community Series Sessions

The Climate Safe Neighborhood Partnership also supported the community engagement efforts of the Green Cincinnati Plan by hosting four Climate Safe Community Series meetings during summer 2022. Climate Safe Community Series were single night events that brought together neighborhood residents to map their priorities for climate adaptation in their communities. The following are the resilience plans developed from these efforts, which in addition to supporting the Green Cincinnati Plan, have informed implementation efforts in the respective neighborhoods and are on the path to being adopted by some neighborhood community councils. Additional neighborhoods engaged were Avondale, the neighborhoods in the Beekman Corridor, Camp Washington, Carthage, Over-the-Rhine, and West End. The Carthage session was facilitated in Spanish.

Special thanks to the more than 225 residents who attended these sessions and contributed their ideas and expertise. 













Southern Avondale


Climate Safe Community Session Map






Carthage Climate Safe Community Session Map
